His latest short film 'Simo' won best Canadian Short at TIFF and is currently selected in film festivals around the world including Sundance and Berlin. Counter Offence by Teesri Duniya Theatre.



Emilee Veluz

Emilee Veluz (she/her) is a Canadian born Filipina that has been working as a professional theatre, film and TV actor for over 20 years. Orient(ed) was voted Montreal Mirror's (now MTL Blog) Montreal's Best Play and Emilee was voted 2nd Best Local Actress. During the pandemic, she was seen virtually in Talisman Theatre's production of Habibi's Angels et la commission impossible. Selected television and film credits include, Clouds, The Moodys, 19-2, Nine Lives, Broken Trust, The Lottery and CTV's Transplant.

DIRECTORS



ISA FUENTES

Isa (they/them) is a Chilean-Canadian transdisciplinary artist based in Montreal. Since graduating from the National Theatre School's Acting program, Isa has pursued their curiosity for movement through studying different somatic practices. They're curious about the physicalization of culture and lived experience, as well as how language influences storytelling. They find joy in researching what exists between disciplines and how we can redefine storytelling practices. You will often find

them roaming through Milton-Parc or pretending to know a lot about herbalism.



Murdoch Schon

Murdoch Schon (they/them) is a queer, nonbinary director and theatre educator. Born and raised in Treaty One Territory (Winnipeg), they have been involved in the Tiohtià:ke (Montreal) English theatre scene for over a decade. As a multidisciplinary theatre maker, they use puppetry, movement and technology to build unique and immersive worlds. Murdoch is fascinated by provocation, vulnerability, and the role of risk and failure in art making. They believe that theatre rises to its true

power through the practices of ritual liminality, community and imagination. Murdoch insists on the wondrous nature of theatre as a transformative space where rulers fail, heroes rise and monsters seem more familiar than angels. Murdoch graduated from the Nation Theatre School Directing Program and has a BFA, Specialization in Theatre and Development, from Concordia University.


